Summer has flown by quickly and Fall activities are well underway. I hope everyone had the opportunity to get some camping, hiking or other outdoor adventure in over the summer months. There has been lots going on in the council as we gear up with our regular scouting activities and continue to plan the reconstruction of Rancho Alegre. Take a look



at the 2017-2018 Program Calendar for an update of events.

As we move into the remaining months of 2018 I thought it would be a good idea to review our BSA Mission Statement:

The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law.

I strongly believe that the values of Scouting are important for everyone regardless of gender. As we are all aware, last year the national board unanimously voted to open our Scouting programs to both boys and girls. I am very pleased that this decision will allow us to bring the values and experiences to more young people.

I continue to be impressed with the number of individuals in our Council that have achieved the rank of Eagle as well as with their Eagle projects. The Eagle project of Life Scout Zac Hall of Arroyo Grande Troop 450 was recently covered on local television. Zac completed a 9/11 memorial which was unveiled at 140 Traffic Way in Arroyo Grande. Congratulations to Zac on a project well done and to all those Eagles who have completed projects this year! I would love to see more publicity like this to make the public more aware of what Scouting does for the community.

Your Council Board will be meeting in November to review and update our strategic plan. As I mentioned in a previous letter, one of the focuses will be on creating an environment that welcomes diversity and inclusion at all levels of our Council. This goes beyond ethnicity to include gender and generational diversity. We feel strongly that this will add to the richness of Scouting through the exchange of ideas from people with various backgrounds and experiences.

I recently visited Rancho Alegre and was very pleased to see the ongoing progress that has been made around main camp and along the roadways. Over 400 trees damaged or killed by the Whittier Fire have been taken down. We are fortunate to have a dedicated team from CCET (California Center of

Educational Training) on site daily for the last several months. They have been cutting, chipping and mowing tirelessly throughout the camp. This team had been provided to our Council through a grant from the state of California. The Council is very grateful for this help!

Thank you for all you do for Scouting and the community!

Program Proclamations

It's time to report back to you and let you know what's up. It's been a good month, lots of units are getting back in the swing of things. Let's talk about what has been going on.

I'm hoping that by now, the changes to Youth Protection Training aren't new to you. The good news is that there's only one version, so those of you that do Cubs, Scouting, Venturing or Exploring, only have one course to worry about. Please remember that in the Los Padres Council, we need to take YPT annually, not every two years. So if you haven't done this new training during 2018 yet, please take the time to get it done.

Watch out for news of a different course plan coming for Wood Badge in 2019. It's going to be closer to home and could really be fun with friends. I expect to have more information on this in the next few issues. Wood Badge is a really good course that can affect you, your unit and is well worth the effort and expense to participate in it.

I'm starting to get excited about October 27th. It's time to mosey over to Orcutt and enjoy University of Scouting 2018. There's all sorts of things happening, registration is available on-line now. You don't want to miss this. There's going to be all sorts of fun things to learn about Scouting, you really do want to get to this event.

I would like to bring up one more item, there are courses that you need to take so you can be considered a trained Leader. Let's spend some time and talk about where to get those Courses. As I've already said, your YPT should

be no more than twelve (12) months old when you go through the yearly registration process. Yes, this means that we are taking this course every year. This way it doesn't expire during the year and surprise you. This training is available online at my.scouting.org. Please be sure to print your certificate. There is also training for your specific position, this training is reached again from the National Website at my.scouting.org and then clicking on the "Learning Center" links. This is called "Leader Specific Training". Your Unit Commissioner can help you figure out which of these courses you'll need, if you have any questions. To finish up, you may need either BALOO (Basic Outdoor Leader Outdoor Orientation) or IOLS (Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills). Just so everybody is on the same page, these courses used to be held by the Council. We have shifted this to your District Training Committee. This means that it can be held closer to you, and that your District Committee can decide when these courses happen. I have heard folks asking when the Council is going to hold these courses, and I wanted to ensure that everybody knows how this is to happen.

If you know how to respond to the question, "Is there a Beaver in the house?" please mark your calendar for a fun date. On Saturday November 3, starting around 3:00 PM continuing to about 7:00 PM, we are going to hold the first annual Los Padres Council Wood Badge Reunion. Please bring a Dutch oven creation to share, any memories you have, or pictures, or souvenirs, or knickknacks or other "valuable" items and come prepared to have a fun time. You will leave with a special patch, more memories, maybe even more friends, and an excuse to sing that wonderful song. You will have also completed Requirements 3 & 7 for the American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award. We will be at Pioneer Park in Santa Maria, over by the airport. There is a \$20 donation requested for this event. That money will cover the patch and also Requirement #7. Charcoal will be provided for your Dutch oven, unless you want to use something other than "Kingsford".

Rancho Alegre Update

The Rancho Alegre Master Plan is close to completion. Our Architects, RRM Design Group and Engineers Stantec, are busily preparing all the designs for submittal to Santa Barbara County. We expect to submit by October 1st. Some features that will be included are a solar panel system and a package wastewater treatment plant. In addition, the Council leadership is meeting with professionals in building trades for guidance and recommendations.

The Los Padres Council entered into an agreement with the Santa Maria Center for Employment Training in which they are providing workers to us to help prepare the Camp for rebuild. The CET members have been working hard by preparing defensible space around the dining hall and the Anacapa/Anapamu Dorm; in the open areas of camp dead chaparral and dead trees are being removed. To date we have removed over 400 dead trees (mostly pine).

Recently we contracted with a tree care company for trimming Oak Trees along the Camp road ways. We have lifted the trees so that they cleared above the road for emergency vehicle accessibility.

Todd Williams, Camp Ranger, is back in at Rancho Alegre. Todd is very happy to be working to get camp running in tip top shape. His past experience will be of great benefit as we prepare camp for the rebuild.

A Call for Support

As the year is coming to a close, we want to remind you that there are plenty of ways you can help Los Padres Council finish the year on a positive note. First and foremost? Ask! Never

feel afraid to ask your district or council representatives what you can do to help the Scouting movement. We are always in need of new, ideas, resources, and volunteer additions—that could be you! As most of you reading this are already devoted volunteers, we think you deserve an honest update on how our Council is doing.

First, the positive: The Rancho Alegre rebuild is making headway with the excellent service of RRM Design Group and Stantec. We plan to have the grading process finished before the rainy season which will help us in avoiding any mudslide mishaps. To finish this part of the project we had to cut down and chip over 400 trees on the campus! It has been a huge project, but we are making excellent headway. Rancho Alegre is on its way to coming back better than ever and with the help of the Phoenix Committee we have made great strides in finding funding for the project. Although we had excellent insurance, we still have about \$6.5 million dollars to raise to fully afford the project.

Now for our concerns: As many of you know, operations at Rancho Alegre were integral to keeping Los Padres Council's budget in line—in fact, it accounted for about half of the Council's overall income. With this loss, we are struggling more than we have in years past. This is a call for support to all willing supporters and Scouters for help in one of the best ways they can: through our annual giving campaign called Friends of Scouting (FOS). Currently, the numbers show that less than 10% of our registered members are participating in the campaign. Without this integral support, Scouting can't survive. Anything helps whether it be fundraisers, FOS presentations, or personal gifts. As fellow Scouters and volunteers, we ask that you consider giving a gift to help support the council in continuing its mission to help our local youth. Contact your local Scouting Representative to find out ways you can help raise funds on a unit, district, or council level.

Scout Meeting Place Inspections

Summer is nearing its end and we are looking forward to a new Scouting year with lots of FUN and adventure.

All of us are committed to providing a FUN and safe experience for the youth in Scouting - have you ever thought about your local unit meeting room - does it really "measure up"

The beginning of a new Scouting year is a great time to do a Meeting Place Inspection – to make sure that our Unit meeting locations are as safe as we can reasonably make them.

The link below is to a handy form from BSA National that can assist each and every Unit in providing a safe environment for meetings - you might also consider contacting your local Fire Department or the County Environmental Health Department (781 5454) for assistance. Get your Chartered Organization Representative (COR) involved, as well as other adults in your Unit and senior youth leaders like your SPL.

Start from the outside in, and look up, down, and around. Is the street addressed posted on the outside of the building so emergency personnel can find you?

Some items on the form that are of special importance -----

EXITS - this is a common area of concern in any public occupancy - can everyone get out, all the time? Are any blocked? LOCKED? What happens once you are outside - are the stairs, etc. safe?

EXTENSION CORDS - they are ONLY for temporary use - never to be fastened to the building, passed through walls, doors, etc.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS - are they handy (normally near a door on the way out), visible, and charged?

FIRE DRILLS - when is the last time your Unit held one?

CURTAINS - although not on the form, any curtain on a "stage or platform" must be made of fire retardant material and have a State Fire Marshal certificate.

- Adults participating in BSA outings for 72 hours or more must be YPT trained

- Login to the My.Scouting.org portal
- Click Menu (top left of screen), then My Dashboard from the menu list.
- The "My Training" screen shows YPT options, click on "Take Course"
- Complete YPT, print certificate

BSA Leadership Training Corner

Leadership training is a focus area of the Boy Scouts of America. Cub scouts prepare to be leaders; and can serve as a Denner with leadership responsibilities. The troops, crews, and ships are to be youth-led. Adult leaders provide support to enable youth to have leadership experiences. Think leadership!

Wood Badge Leadership Experience

This 6-day (usually 2 long weekends) leadership training



opportunity helps adult scout leaders learn how to lead and how to help youth to lead. The training is followed by individual pursuits to accomplish goals established during the course. It is often a life-changing experience!

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)

This 6-day (usually 2 long weekends) leadership training opportunity helps youth scout leaders learn how to lead. It is often a life-changing experience!



How Does Leadership Training Happen?

- We need participants to take the course. The ideal is for each unit to have adults that have completed Wood Badge training and the tradition of youth participating in NYLT when they are 13 or 14 years old
- We need staff for the Wood Badge course (adults) and for the NYLT course (mainly youth, some adults). Both youth and adults achieve a greater depth of understand leadership after they serve on staff.

- We need course directors that are qualified from their experience serving as staff

In the Los Padres Council we are actively looking for staff for Wood Badge and NYLT. If you have your beads (completion of Wood Badge training) and would like to serve on staff, please contact Lynn Johnson (489-6072 or lynnhjohnson@gmail.com). Dues Increase for 2019:

The LEC raised the annual dues from \$15 to \$20, but please read on about some incentives that are being offered for the upcoming year to encourage early dues payment. Because of the fire that destroyed Rancho Alegre, the Lodge has incurred some significant costs for Ordeals and functions that it previously did not have. Major meals are being catered and smaller meals are being purchased locally. Before the Lodge used the Rancho Alegre kitchen staff who used their bulk ordering and discounts for Outdoor School. In addition to this, the Ranch still does not have potable water or gas for cooking. Also, our membership numbers have dropped.

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Also, it has been quite a few years since the Lodge raised its dues.

Now for the incentives:

First, anyone paying their dues before December 31, 2018, will only pay \$15. Only those delaying payment until January or February or later will then pay \$20 for 2019 dues.

Second, in 2017, we allowed anyone who wanted one additional dues patch to pay \$10 for that patch. Thus, if you want the second patch for another uniform, trading, or your collection, you can do so. However, the order and payment for the second patch must accompany your 2019 dues form and payment no later than December 31st.

Please do not pay your dues just yet. New forms and online registration will be out later this week.

Ordeal Follow-up:

During the Summer Ordeal 22 new Ordeal Members were inducted and 3 new Brotherhood Honors were attained.

The service performed included removal of a lot of burnt tree and shrubbery. This was necessary for certain County of Santa Barbara imposed restrictions before construction permits would be issued. A number of signs were painted and trails were cleared. Thank you to all who helped make the future of Rancho Alegre a reality.

We want to thank Dr. Sage Hider for the donation of a propane grill for the Lodge and the Ranch. This grill will be useful for future activities, especially while we are in construction and don't have full utilities.

Upcoming Events:

Each Chapter will be electing their new Chapter Officers at their next meeting. Chapter Officers include a Chapter Chief, Chapter Vice Chief, and a Chapter Recorder. The Chapter Officers will be installed in their positions on Saturday, November 17th, along with the Lodge Officers at the Annual Banquet. At the Banquet, awards and certificates are given out. Earlier in the day will be the Lodge

Leadership Development which is open to ALL Arrowmen. Put the afternoon and evening of Saturday, November 17th on your calendar. More information will be sent out in the next issue of the Bear Claw.

Arrow of Light Ceremonies

National has issued a new ceremony and guidelines for Arrow of Light Ceremonies. This change becomes effective January 1, 2019. No other ceremony may be used. In addition, there will be absolutely NO use of Indian regalia, etc. in the ceremony. Information will be issued to the Packs regarding this change.

Also with the revised Cub Scout advancement program, Webelos should be bridging in February or March so that they have sufficient interaction with their unit and its leaders prior to Summer Camp. This earlier date creates scheduling problems when unit elections are left to the last month (March).

Unit Elections and Call-outs

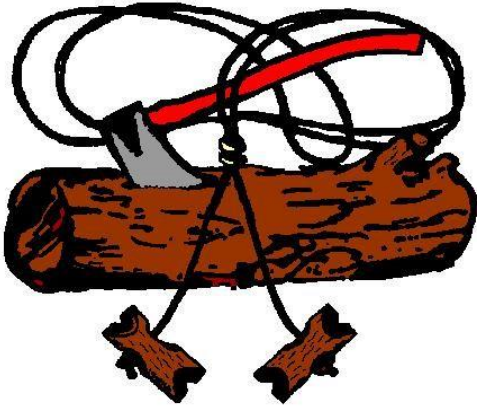

WHAT IS WOOD BADGE?

Wood Badge is the next step beyond your basic Scout leader training.

In basic training, you learn position-specific skills, like how to be, say, a Cubmaster.

In Wood Badge, you learn how to be a leader.

Participants spend 6 full days (two-three-day weekends) learning modern leadership theories from contemporary scholars such as Ken Blanchard (author of the *One Minute Manager*), Stephen Covey (author of *Seven Habits of Highly Effective People* and *Principle Centered Leadership*) and Spenser Johnson (author of *Who Moved My Cheese*) to name a few.

You also learn by doing — working in a team, planning a project, solving problems, etc.

Participants then have 18 months to apply these skills in five different projects they choose.

The course fee covering both weekends is \$250. Participants must complete both weekends and the five projects (the “ticket”) to receive course credit and the Wood Badge regalia.

(The actual Wood Badge ticket is a series of five projects that benefit Scouting. After the in-person course, Wood Badgers complete these ticket items to receive beads.)

American Wood Badge Alumni 70th Anniversary Service Award requirements

Wood Badgers will agree to and work a new ticket. To qualify for the award, individuals must complete **five** of the following nine requirements during the anniversary year — Jan. 1, 2018, to Dec. 31, 2018.



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1. Register as member of the Scouting Alumni and Friends, at any level.
 2. Attend a district, council or national level **training course** either as a participant or staff member OR serve as staff on a Wood Badge course.
 3. Participate in a 70th Anniversary celebration in your Council such as a reception, reunion or other special acknowledgement at a Council wide event such as annual recognition or F.O.S. dinner.
 4. Recruit another individual to attend and volunteer at a Boy Scout **training event** or Wood Badge service activity.
 5. Share the values of Wood Badge and Scouting by recruiting an individual to take Wood Badge.
 6. Promote Wood Badge training at a unit, district, council area, region or national event.
 7. Contribute \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount you can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
 8. Solicit another individual to join you in contributing \$7 or \$70 or whatever larger amount they can to an existing council custodial fund for Wood Badge scholarships.
 9. Become a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America at the unit, district or Council level.
- Consider such opportunities for service as: district committee, commissioner, roundtable staff, Alumni or NESA committees and more.
