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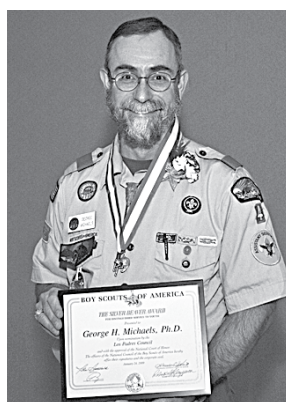

Established in 1931, the Silver Beaver Award is presented for distinguished service to young people within a Boy Scout local council. More than 50,000 recognitions have been conferred to date. A recipient must be a registered adult member of the BSA. The awards are bestowed at appropriate local functions. Silver Beaver Awards are presented on the basis of the number of units in a council.

Scouting has always depended on volunteer registered adult leaders, primarily parents of Scouts, to lead packs, troops, teams, crews, and ships. It is also part of Scouting's tradition that most parents who are not registered leaders pitch in from time to time to help out. To encourage involvement and more engagement of volunteers at all levels, the Boy Scouts of America has developed the National Parent Initiative.

The **National Parent Initiative** is a unique opportunity to engage more parents in Scouting, especially at the unit level. The emphasis is on capturing a parent's interest and support to become more involved and committed to the success of their child's Scouting experience. It will enhance youth and adult enthusiasm, recruitment, retention, achievement, and the family FUN of Scouting with a passionate commitment by all who participate.

Role of the ScoutParents Unit Coordinator

All units are encouraged to appoint at least one **ScoutParents** unit coordinator who will serve as a registered member of the unit's committee or as one of its assistant unit leaders. The coordinator will complete the adult volunteer application and pay the annual \$10 registration fee. Coordinators will go through the regular adult background check like all other registered leaders. Larger units may have more than one person serving in this key position.

The **ScoutParents unit coordinator** welcomes all parents to the unit and keeps them informed by doing the following:

- 1) Assign parents to help with at least one specific task, assignment, or project annually.

- 2) Provide an orientation for all parents about how the unit works and the benefits to their family.
- 3) Keep parents updated on the unit's program and their child's involvement.

This position will help involve more adults with the unit's program, thus creating a better informed group of parents connected to their child's Scouting experience. The support and commitment of parents directly affects the quality of the unit's program and provides a more meaningful experience for everyone, especially the Scouts!

Fast start training is available for all **ScoutParents** unit coordinators. Access the training by going to the official **ScoutParents** Web site, www.scoutparents.org; the national Web site, www.scouting.org; or directly to the online learning site, www.olc.scouting.org. This training will assist them in understanding their position and with learning how to work closer with the parents in their unit. When a new **ScoutParents** unit coordinator is officially registered, he/she will receive an e-mail from the National Council welcoming them to the program and encouraging them to go to the **ScoutParents** Web site for more details and support.

Each registered **ScoutParents** unit coordinator will be encouraged to create a MyScouting account, giving them access to other resources to support their efforts. This access will also give them the ability to print a member roster of the parents in their unit who are active **ScoutParents**. There is also a special leadership emblem available for this registered position. They can wear it on their uniform if they want to become a uniformed leader or they can wear it on a T-shirt or hat if they desire.

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Wood Badge for the 21st Century

Course Dates: **September 24 -26, 2009 at Rancho Alegre**
October 15-17, 2009 at Camp French

Los Padres Council is proud to announce it will be offering Wood Badge for the 21st Century training next fall. Course director, Terry Pew, and others from the council recently attended a training conference in northern California to prepare for putting on this advanced adult leadership training.

The theme for the course is **"creating a legacy,"** which Terry says, " promotes the idea that as Boy Scouting in America celebrates its 100th anniversary in 2010, we realize the legacy which has been passed on to us and now it is our turn to create a new legacy of Scouting for the 21st century. Becoming Wood Badge trained is a great way to ensure the legacy of Scouting will continue."

Why Wood Badge?

The primary purpose of the Wood Badge experience is to strengthen Scouting in our units, districts, and local councils. The Wood Badge Ticket represents the participant's commitment to complete a set of personal goals relating to that individuals' Scouting position.

What is Wood Badge?

Wood Badge is the advanced training program for all Scouters involved in the BSA programs. Wood Badge consists of two parts. The first part reflects unit meetings, while the second part of the course uses a unit camping activity as its delivery method.

As a result of attending Wood Badge, participants will be able to:

1. View Scouting globally, as a family of interrelated, values-based programs that provide age-appropriate activities for youth.
2. Recognize the contemporary leadership concepts utilized in corporate America and leading government organizations that are relevant to our values-based movement.
3. Revitalize your commitment by sharing in an overall inspirational experience that helps provide Scouting with the leadership it needs to accomplish its mission on an ongoing basis.
4. Apply the skills you will learn from your participation as a member of a successful working team.

The themes that will encapsulate the course content are:

- Living the Values
- Bringing the Vision to Life
- Models of Success
- Tools of the Trade
- Leading to Make a Difference

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Tres Robles Seeks Participants

In Scouting we say that "Every Boy Deserves A Trained Leader", and that certainly is true. Could you do your job as a unit leader without taking the training that is specific to your position? Well, maybe, but certainly not as well or with as much confidence as when you have taken the appropriate training courses.

And you know, that same premise applies to your youth leaders. Can they do their jobs as Senior Patrol Leader, Patrol Leader, Troop Guide, and etc. without training for their specific position? Again, maybe, but certainly not as well as when they have taken the appropriate training course for their position. And in the Los Padres Council, that appropriate training course is called Tres Robles.

Tres Robles, National Youth Leadership Training is the Los Padre's Council advanced leadership training course for Scouting's youth leaders. It is a course that is primarily staffed and run by Boy Scouts. The course is designed to enhance the Troop Leadership Training that Scout leaders should conduct at the unit level. Scouts attending and completing Tres Robles will develop new leadership skills and know what a leader must be, know what a leader must know, and know what a leader must do.

To attend Tres Robles, a Scout must be at least 13 years of age, but not yet 18 by June 22, 2009, and First Class rank; completion of troop level Troop Leadership Training is highly recommended; and be approved by his unit leader.

Tres Robles Objectives:

- Give participants the confidence and knowledge to conduct the troop program.
- Provide participants with a clear understanding of team and personal development and how those elements relate to being a leader.
- Guide the participants through the stages of team development.
- Experience an environment of Scouting fellowship and fun.
- Give Boy Scouts the opportunity to work with Boy Scouts from other troops.

This year's course will be held June 22 – 27 at Camp Mabel French located near Lake Lopez in Arroyo Grande. The course fee is \$250. WHO SHOULD ATTEND: Every Scouter that thinks Scouting should be a safe place for your Cubs, Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venturers. Scouts/Venture members over 16 are also welcome to attend and participate in the training.

WHAT WILL BE COVERED? Safe Swim Defense, Safety Afloat, Trek Safely, Climb-On Safely, Weather Safety, and you will be trained and certified in Basic First Aid and CPR.



This one day training event will ensure that your unit will be able to safely conduct trips and outings that require these important safety courses. If you look at the current Tour Permit applications, you will notice that many of the trips you plan need to have qualified adult leaders to conduct the tour or trip.

THE COST: Is only \$35 per person, and includes lunch and your First Aid and CPR certifications. Thanks to a grant from our National Office Risk Management Program, we are able to offer this course at a greatly reduced fee. RANCHO ALEGRE CAMPS OFFERED THIS SUMMER

Have you made your summer outdoor plans yet? If not, plan on coming to Rancho Alegre for some really great programs this summer. We will be offering our Boy Scout Summer Camp, Cub Resident Camp, a specialized advanced aquatics camp, and a Venturing camp as well.

Cub Scout Camp Details:

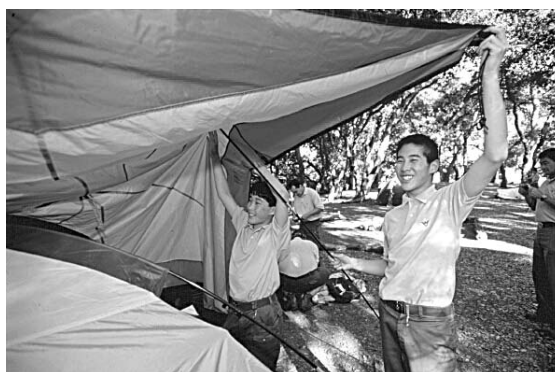
- Cub Resident Camp for Wolves and Bears: July 5 – 8
 - Cub Resident Camp for Webelos: July 8 – 11
- Cost for the Cub Scout camp sessions is \$195 (\$135 for Cub/Webelos and \$60 for the adult partner).

If paid in full by June 15, you will receive a \$10 discount. Cub Scouts and their partners will enjoy swimming, hiking, archery, BB gun shooting, camping skills, campfires, rank advancement, games, and much more!

Boy Scout Camp Details:

- Boy Scout Resident Camp: July 12 – 18.

The Eagle Requirement and Trail to First Class programs will once again be offered. All required Eagle Scout merit badges will be offered, as well as many of the requirements for First Class Scout. This is a great opportunity for young men who want to work on their Eagle requirements, but may be limited on time. Similarly, the Trail to First Class program can give those new Scouts a real jump on attaining their First Class rank. Among some of the many merit badges being offered (not a complete list at this time) are archery, rifle shooting, shotgun



shooting, leatherwork, basketry, law, computers, fire safety, canoeing, and more!

Boy Scout Resident Camp Costs:

- Los Padres Council Scouts with Unit Leaders \$250
- Los Padres Council Individual Scouts (provisional camping) \$275
- Out of Council Scouts with Unit Leaders \$270
- Out of Council individual Scouts (provisional camping) \$295
- Additional Adult Leaders \$125

****** Two adult leaders attend camp free if your unit has between five and 20 Scouts. If fees are paid in full by June 15, you will receive a \$10 discount.

Advanced Aquatic Skills Camp will be offered from July 19 – 22.

If you are serious about enhancing your aquatic skills, then this is the camp for you. This camp is open to Boy Scouts, Venturers, adults, and non-Scouts as well. Among the programs that will be taught are BSA Lifeguard, snorkeling BSA, Scuba BSA (this is a familiarization course, not certification), mile swim, canoeing, rowing, safe-swim defense, safety afloat, CPR and First Aid. Cost for this camp is \$205 (includes first aid and CPR certification). If fee is paid in fully by June 15, you will receive a \$10 discount.

Spring Recruitment Essential for All Units

Recruiting for Cub Scout Packs, Boy Scout Troops and Venture Crews is a year round job. All units are encouraged to have a spring recruiting event.

For Cub Scout Packs, plan a day in the park. Set up your pinewood derby track, if you have an open area or have a kite day. Check with one of your fire stations if you can have an open house there. Be sure to have snacks and games for the kids and an incentive (prize) for the boys that bring a friend and for the boys that sign up.

For Boy Scout Troops, have your Scouts invite their friends to a day hike cook out, bike ride, fishing day etc. Remember that new boys on their trail to First Class need to invite a friend to a Scouting event. You may want to consider inviting first year Webelos Scouts, as they will be moving into Boy Scouts in less than a year.

For Venture Crews, the first rule is that a crew that is active, or has a lot of interesting activities on their calendar, will recruit faster than one which does not. An active crew will have enthusiastic youth members and the most effective recruiter in Venturing is a Venturer who likes their crew and its activities.

Appoint an adult leader within your unit to oversee your recruiting efforts who can provide leader-



ship to recruiting activities and share information about your Cub Scout Pack, Boy Scout Troop or Venture Crew. This individual will be responsible for obtaining names, phone numbers and emails for every family in attendance and share the ScoutParents information (***more information on page three of this newsletter issue***) with new parents to engage their participation in the beginning.

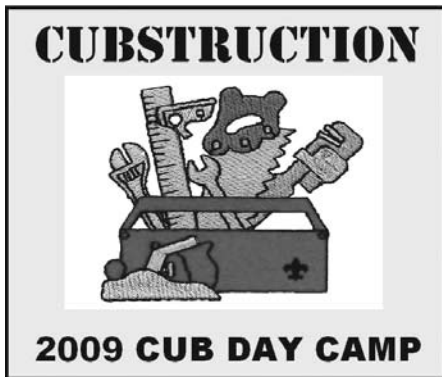

WHO CAN ATTEND DAY CAMP?

All registered Cub Scouts! Yes, even those new Tiger Cubs who just joined your Cub Scout Pack.

WHAT ABOUT LEADERSHIP?

Cub Scouts should register with their Cub Scout Pack. Pack leadership and parents are encouraged to participate. Cub Scout Packs may be required to provide adult leadership and will be notified if necessary. A volunteer that works the entire week at Cub Scout Day Camp shall pay a fee of 50% of the early bird fee (this year that would be \$52.50) for their son(s) to attend day camp.

WHAT TO BRING?

Cub Scouts should bring a sack lunch each day; bring non-perishable foods & drinks only. Bring rain gear if weather looks threatening, sunscreen and bug repellent. Everything else is provided. Adults may bring a chair and a small tarp for the boys to sit on.

INSURANCE

A special accident insurance policy will be provided. This is secondary insurance and will become effective after a family policy is exhausted. A \$100 deductible applies.

WHAT ABOUT YOUNGER CHILDREN?

A special area will be available for younger children of adults who are serving on day camp staff and are at camp on the days needed. A nominal fee of \$30 covers the entire week or for any combination of days. Snacks, tee shirts, and activities will be provided. These children should also bring a sack lunch. Parents must be a volunteer at camp while younger children are present. You are required to pre-register your young children as well.

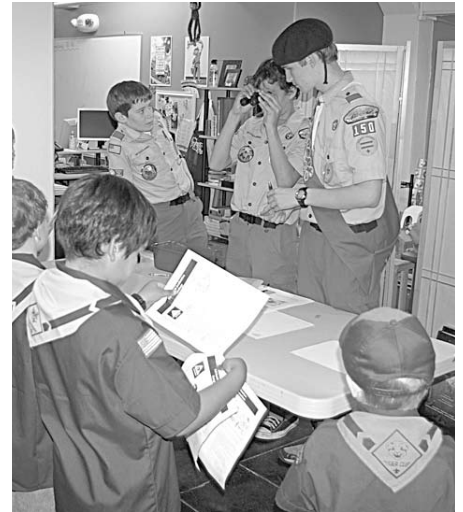

Council Launches "Lost" Eagle Scout Campaign

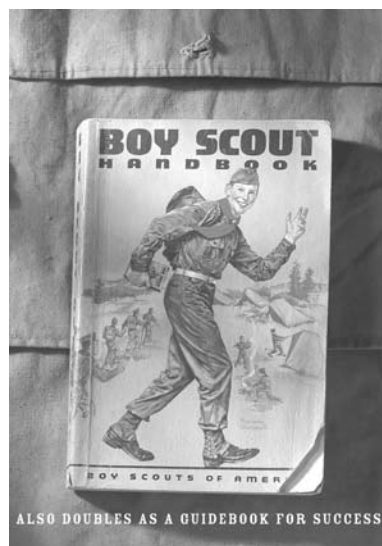
